Item 1: Call to order: 6:00 P.M.

Item 5: Review and Approve BOS Meeting Minutes for 03/27/2023:

Selectman Leach motion to approve 03/27/2023 minutes pending changes, Selectman Cullett second, 3-0,

Item 6: Updates of Departments:

Fire Department-Selectman Leach mentioned that he received an email from Fire Chief Pelkey, and the brake parts have not been received to fix the fire engine.

Highway Department-Selectman Leach mentioned that the fuel account has an overage and the accountant recommended that the Board of Selectmen meet with the Finance Committee to request a Reserve Fund transfer at the next BOS/FIN COM meeting. Selectman Leach will place the Reserve Fund transfer on April 10, 2023, Board of Selectmen's meeting.

Selectman Cullett updated the board on a Massachusetts Municipal Association Seminar that he and Highway Superintendent Russell attended in Holyoke, MA. Selectman Cullett mentioned that there are bills going to the legislature that will benefit small towns. One benefit to small towns is adjustments to the in Lieu of Taxes formula that sets value on state owned land. Chapter 90 funding was also discussed as well as investing in local roads. Peru is in the low end because the of population and the state is attempting to make changes so that all towns are treated fairly. Selectman Cullett felt that the new administration plans on making positive changes to help small towns.

Selectman Haskins presented two quotes for sheds from Sheds and Stuff in Cheshire, MA.

- One quote for the compactor shed is \$4,800.00 for a 10 X 10
- One quote for the parks shed is \$3,500 for an 8 X 8.

Selectman Cullett felt that other quotes should be obtained for the sheds. Selectman Haskins mentioned that a resident suggested that the new shed be moved. Selectman Leach felt that that should be left up to the Highway Superintendent. Selectman Cullet felt that moving the shed didn't make any sense.

Selectman Leach mentioned that they have a person interested in the Assessor position. Selectman Leach notify Amy Davidson-Assessor and will call interested party. Selectman Leach will invite the person for an interview. Selectman Cullett revisited the legal decision by KP Law regarding 1- member Board of Assessors. The board felt that the decision of KP Law was not a bad legal opinion regarding a 1- member Board of Assessors. The issue is that the Department of Revenue prefers a 3-member board. The Department of Revenue does not recognize the change from a 3-member board to a 1-member board until it is voted at the Annual Town Meeting.

Selectman Haskins mentioned an email that was received from Fire Chief Pelkey after his budget was voted on at the last Board of Selectmen/Finance Committee meeting. Selectman Haskins mentioned that the Fire Department's revised budget is in place, and the Fire Chief must make it work. The board agreed that the town cannot pay volunteer fire fighters.

Item 7: <u>Discussion and possible vote to reappoint Tina Barrington as Board of Registrars</u>: Selectman leach motion to appoint Tina Barrington to the Board of Registrars, Selectman Cullett second, unanimous vote 3-0

Item 8: <u>Discussion and possible vote on repair for the Peru Fire Engine</u>: Selectman Leach mentioned there were no updates at this time and placed on hold.

<u>Item 9: Discussion of FY24 Budgets:</u> Darryl Darby mentioned that the Board of Health is requesting \$1,000 for FY24. Darryl is hopeful there is \$400 remaining in the grant for the Board of Health's legal notice and will speak with the Town Treasurer to get a balance.

Selectman Haskins mentioned that he doesn't believe there is enough grant funds to pay for the Parks Shed and he feels that the shed should be a Free Cash item.



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


THE STATE OF RURAL MASSACHUSETTS

The 170 rural communities in the Commonwealth require a comprehensive and sustained commitment from the state to address decades of disinvestment, resulting in declining population growth; a disproportionately aging population: lower wages; and difficulty attracting or retaining a young, skilled workforce. A slower recovery from the great recession, compounded by the COVID-19 pandemic has further deteriorated the economic and demographic conditions of rural communities. However, rural communities are also best positioned, now more than ever, to capture investments and grow. These regions provide a high quality of life with unique access to the outdoors, excellent schools, close knit communities, and rich with critical natural resources.

OUR WORK

The Rural Policy Advisory Commission (RPAC) was created by the Legislature in 2015. The commission serves as a research body for issues critical to the welfare and vitality of rural communities and studies, reviews, and reports on the status of rural communities and residents in the Commonwealth. Additionally, the RPAC advises the General Court and the Executive Branch on the impact of existing and proposed state laws, policies and regulations, and seeks to advance legislative and policy solutions that address rural needs. RPAC is also charged with advocating to ensure that rural communities receive a fair share of state investment, promoting collaboration among rural communities to improve efficiency in delivery of services, and developing and supporting new leadership in rural communities.



THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS

The Legislature's 193rd session (2023-2024) officially began on January 4th. All timely filed legislation was filed by January 20th, and given House and Senate docket numbers. During March of the first year, the bills are assigned, based on topic matter, to their respective committees and given their official bill numbers. Shortly after, hearings will begin. All timely filed legislation will be heard before February 7, 2024. After bills are heard, they may be reported favorably out of committee, or sent to study. Most bills that are reported favorably will move to Ways and Means for additional consideration, and eventually, if successful, to the floor of each chamber to be engrossed, and passed. Bills passed by the House and Senate are sent to the Governor for her consideration, and ultimately vetoed, or signed into law.

HOW YOU CAN SUPPORT

Your advocacy is incredibly important to move these legislative priorities forward. Between the filing deadline in January and any action taken by committees on bills, House and Senate members may cosponsor bills, showing their support by "signing onto" the legislation. Reach out to your legislator to request their cosponsorship on the legislation to show the widespread support for these bills. After bills are assigned to committees, hearings begin. These hearings provide an opportunity to voice your support in person, virtually, and/or in written format. Sign up on malegislature.gov for the My Legislature tool to be notified when bills are being heard. You may sign up with the committee for in person testimony, virtual testimony via Microsoft teams, or you may submit written documents. Most importantly, make you voice heard.

PRIORITIES



ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The economic and demographic trends in rural Massachusetts are more varied than the Greater Boston region, with some small areas growing quickly, but many others are facing slow to declining growth, lower income levels, lower housing values, and economies more dependent on public and non-profit sectors. To cultivate economic growth, reforms must be made to generate additional revenue streams, update inequitable funding formulas, provide technical assistance, and increase investment in rural regions.



TRANSPORTATION

Rural communities are overburdened by the costs of maintaining transportation infrastructure. Chapter 90 is the main source of funding used by municipalities to complete improvements and maintenance and is insufficient to keep up with needs. Many rural towns have large networks of aging roads, bridges, and culverts that are in need of maintenance and repair. Rural communities struggle to pay for design and engineering plans in order to get projects included on the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) or to apply for other grants. Aside from roads, the lack of regional transit funding makes it difficult for our residents to get around. Expanded micro-transit is is an additional priority for the commission to address this need.



HOUSING

Housing values tend to be lower in rural areas than the rest of the state. While this generally reflects lower demand for housing and declining population, property values are the most critical source of revenue generation for municipalities, leading to a systemic lack of financing capacity in many rural communities. Though housing challenges occur statewide, rural regions need unique strategies for smaller scale housing projects, and the revenue to make these investments.



MUNICIPAL SUPPORT

The combination of limited commercial activity in rural communities, lower property values and income, and a large percentage of total acreage in rural towns being tax-exempt, makes it difficult to generate municipal revenue. State funding formulas and grant programs also often favor more populated municipalities, making it significantly more difficult for communities to fund capital projects, and keep up with the increasing costs of education, infrastructure, or municipal employee wages. Identifying ways to increase state support for rural communities is essential to ensure long term, fiscal sustainability.

A ORKEUROR FOR RURAL AFFAIRS



We are pleased to announce that our first legislative priority, An Act relative to the rural policy advisory commission, has been accomplished administratively through the tremendous support of Governor Healey and Lieutenant Governor Kim Driscoll.

We applaud the efforts of this new administration, so early on, for recognizing the unique needs of rural communities and establishing this critical position.

Housed in the Executive Office of Economic Development, the Director of Rural Affairs will serve as a dedicated advocate and ombudsman for rural communities. They will be responsible for cultivating rural economic development and coordinating with secretariats and state agencies to ensure that state government is attuned to the unique needs of rural communities. The Director of Rural Affairs will be tasked with conducting a review of all state grant opportunities to ensure that barriers for rural and small towns are mitigated. They will also be instructed to host dedicated office hours for rural towns to receive technical assistance to identify and explore grant opportunities.

We also wish to thank you, the advocates for rural communities, for your steadfast support and for using your voice to stand up for rural communities across the Commonwealth.
